Presentation on the Maui and Hawai'i Island Brush Fires



'Ōlelo Mua Preamble



This Emergency Meeting of the Hawai'i Tourism Authority Board is being held pursuant to Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS) §92-8(a).

The Board finds that the recent brush fires in Maui and Hawai'i counties have presented an imminent peril to the public health, safety and welfare that requires the Board to hold an emergency meeting to determine whether it is appropriate at this time to request the governor to declare that a tourism emergency exists. At least two-thirds of the Board members agree that these findings are correct and that an emergency exists.

'Ōlelo Mua Preamble



Pursuant to HRS § 201B-9(a), if the Board determines that the recent catastrophic event "adversely affects Hawaii's tourism industry by resulting in a substantial interruption in the commerce of the State and adversely affecting the welfare of its people, the board shall submit a request to the governor to declare that a tourism emergency exists." Such a declaration would allow HTA, through its Board, to develop and implement measures to respond to the emergency and allow the use of moneys in the tourism emergency special fund for the response if necessary.

'Ōlelo Mua Preamble



HTA manages assets that could be brought to bear to assist in responding to the emergency. This includes not only the tourism emergency special fund, but also HTA's unique experience, partnerships across multiple disciplines, and relationships with government, tourism related industry, destination stewardship entities, local communities, and community organizations.

Prioritizing the use of these assets effectively is critical to HTA's short-term response to the emergency, and longer-term implications for the State, its economy, and its people.

Assistance Center at Hawai'i Convention Center (ESF-6)



- For visitors who evacuated, an **Assistance Center** was established on Wednesday, August 9to help them connect and arrange flights or other accommodations.
- The American Red Cross led the Assistance Center operations. The Hawai'i Convention Center quickly prepared the space and meals for all assistees and volunteers. TheBus (8/9-8/12) provided shuttle service from HNL. State Sheriffs provided 24-hour security. Coordination took place between DOT-Airports, The Bus, and HTA.
- Assistance tables were staffed by HTA, READ, HTUSA, O'ahu Visitors Bureau, the Visitor Aloha Society of Hawai'i, volunteers from Hawaiian Airlines, members of Honolulu's Consular Corps, and others.

Assistance Center at Ke'ehi Lagoon Memorial Hall (ESF-6)



- The Assistance Center was moved on Sunday, August 13 to the Ke'ehi Lagoon Memorial Hall, which is much closer to HNL
- The American Red Cross continues to lead the Assistance Center operations. Roberts Hawai'i is providing shuttle service from HNL.
 State Sheriffs continuing to provide 24-hour security.
- Assistance tables are staffed by the Visitor Aloha Society of Hawai'i, volunteers from Hawaiian Airlines, members of Honolulu's Consular Corps, and others.

Temporary Housing Task Force (ESF-6) HAWAII TOURISM.



- A Temporary Housing Task Force is working around the clock to provide options for taking care of survivors who lost their homes.
- The Task Force is being led by Jimmy Tokioka, DBEDT Director, and Luke Meyers, Disaster Management Coordinator in the Office of the Governor.

The Task Force is headquartered at the Hawai'i Convention Center with staff support from DBEDT, HTA, and other agencies.

Temporary Housing Task Force (ESF-6) HAWAII TOURISM.



- Visitors in West Maui have heeded the call to leave to free up resources for our residents and recovery. Hotels in West Maui have temporarily stopped accepting bookings of future reservations.
- At this time, many hotels are housing their own employees and families 700 people in the Kā'anapali area alone.
- Now that hotels have power restored, they are housing emergency workers and displaced residents.

Temporary Housing Task Force (ESF-6)



- The task force is tracking two **Shelter To Hotel** initiatives.
- FEMA and the American Red Cross are working to get registered survivors into hotel rooms, in direct partnership with the hotels. Governor Green directed the task force to stand up a parallel state program for unmet needs (those who do not qualify under FEMA's programs)
- As of mid-day yesterday, 200 people have already moved out of shelters and into hotels.




- HHFDC's Hawai'i Fire Relief Housing Program launched yesterday, uniting available housing with people who need it: 'ohana units, vacation rentals, guest rooms, any kind of space.
- On day 1, nearly 300 landlords and property managers and over 300 evacuees have expressed interest in the program.

DBEDT/READ Analysis



Economic loss per day from business operations:

- Total sales revenue loss per day in the statewide economy: \$8.5 million
- Household income loss: \$2.9 million

- State tax revenue loss: \$414,000
- Direct job loss: 10,000

DBEDT/READ Analysis



Economic loss per day from reduction of visitors:

- Direct visitor spending loss per day: \$1.05 million
- Total sales loss including multiplier effects: \$1.96 million
- Household income loss: \$535,500
- State tax loss: \$121,800

DBEDT/READ Analysis



Value of residential property damages:

- Total number of homes damaged: 1,700 (some may be commercial)
- Average home value in Lahaina: \$725,000
- % of building value: 40% (assumption, 60% land)
- Total value of home damages: \$493 million
- Personal property damages are NOT included.

Historical Emergencies



2018: Kaua'i Floods and Kīlauea Volcano Eruption: Did not use Tourism Emergency Fund

- Kaua'i Shuttle Service in April 2018
 - Provided emergency shuttle service for residents of Kaua'i's North Shore in response to the record rainfall.(\$180,000)
- Kīlauea Volcano Eruption in May 2018
 - USA: \$250,000 for PR and social media campaign
 - Japan: \$700,000 for direct to consumer campaign (\$250,000) and airline and wholesaler co-op campaign (\$450,000)
